Carter David Brenchley -As Strong As They Come

We all have challenges. But one three-year-old member of our family, Carter David Brenchley, has had an extra share. And he's overcoming them like a super hero. Carter is the son of Kate and Cory Brenchley, grandson to Amy Buis and the fifth great grandson of Josef Niehues and Maria Anna Beerman.

Two days after his birth at St. Francis Hospital in Indianapolis, Carter was life-lined to Riley Hospital. Doctors had discovered a heart murmur, and subsequently diagnosed him with Ebstein's anomaly. This is a rare congenital heart condition, an abnormality of the muscle of the right ventricle. Carter's situation required that he have surgery at 15 days old to put in a shunt to increase pulmonary blood flow, bypassing the right side of his heart. He came home with Kate & Cory for the first time at one month old.



But then, one year later Carter was again at Riley for surgery. His shunt was not helping his condition and he needed an angioplasty very quickly. Again, the operation assisted his heart to operate more efficiently. This second surgery went well.

The next obstacle came in June of 2014, when he was 22 months old. The family learned that he would need open heart surgery to repair his heart valve. However, this time there were complications after his surgery and Carter needed to stay at Riley for a month.

After getting over these major hurdles, this young man is a happy three year old. He's living with his condition with the help of his supportive family. But his heart still needs improving and he will need monitoring for his whole life. His parents watch him closely as they plan for a necessary valve replacement as he outgrows the current adjustments. Hopefully he will be 15 or 16 years old before he tackles another surgery. But they already know he needs a valve replacement that would be best when he grows into the teen years.

That correction should go a long way toward better health for Carter.

His mother, Kate, says: "He tires more quickly than most children. But he doesn't know the difference since he's always been this way. He has to stop and rest about every 15 minutes. And then he's ready to play again. We just got home from Chucky Cheese. He received a truck as a prize that he's enjoying a lot."

How does their family live with this challenge? First, Kate quit her job to be with Carter. They take him to Riley Hospital for his checkups every three to four months. Routinely they keep an eye out for signs of low oxygen when he overexerts himself. But, his parents try to keep Carter's life pretty normal. Of course, he loves the family's pets, Thor, the ferret, and his kitten, Loki. Kate tells me: "When my husband and I play on our softball team, Carter stays with his grandmother or other family. His favorite toys are cars and trains. And he's excited about dressing in his super hero costumes."

It's wonderful that the medical procedures are available to help Carter. He's a brave member of this Niehaus family and an example to others who have challenges to overcome. Best wishes to the Brenchleys.
